



“Console Comparison”

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There are dozens of inexpensive PA and “live music” mixers on the market. Can they be used in a broadcast studio? **Not really.** They’re not designed for broadcast use. They just don’t have the features or functionality needed for “real-world” broadcast studio or webcasting applications.

What are the differences between the SIXMIX console and a live music mixer??

Booth Headphone output	Essential	No
Talkback system	Essential	No
Mix-Minus output	Essential	No
Slate mic to main mix	Never!	Yes
EQ on inputs	Never!	Essential
Level Metering	VU or Average	Peak reading
Pan pots for mics	Undesirable	Essential
Effects buses	Not needed	Essential
Installation	Permanent	Temporary
Cable plug-in	On back	On top

The conclusion? A *broadcast* console is very different from a *PA mixer!*
